### MotMot: A tiny kitten with big plans

When MotMot, an adorable tabby kitten, was transferred into our care this spring, we estimated her age to be around 8 weeks. With a rare condition that was stunting her growth, tiny **MotMot had a big surprise in store for us.** 

Upon her arrival, MotMot appeared healthy, so we prepared her for adoption just as we would any healthy kitten — we examined her, gave her ageappropriate vaccinations and spayed her. But not long after her spay surgery, our staff started observing some abnormalities in MotMot. She was not gaining weight at the normal rate, and she was drinking and using her litter box much more than is typical for a kitten her size.

Concerned, our shelter veterinary team began running tests and consulting with veterinary specialists. Soon, they discovered MotMot's pituitary gland, which produces hormones to regulate vital bodily functions, was not working as it should. Our Associate Veterinarian Dr. David Molinas diagnosed MotMot

with congenital hypothyroidism and central diabetes insipidus and immediately began medical treatment.

Hypothyroidism, which Dr. Molinas thinks is responsible for

MotMot's small size, is extremely rare in cats and can be life threatening if left untreated. With the help of a thyroid supplement, MotMot's thyroid function is much improved, and she's growing.

While she may never be a big cat, she will be a healthy one thanks to the generous support of friends like you.

We are happy to report that MotMot met a loving and

experienced cat guardian who was eager to tend to MotMot's special needs and could not resist her charm. MotMot is thriving in her attentive adopter's home, where we know MotMot will be loved for her lifetime.

As of July 21, 742 pets have benefited from the individual attention and support given by 252 foster care volunteers this year. We have welcomed 149 new fosters to this community, but we can still use more help!

Did you know becoming a foster care volunteer is both easy and rewarding? Our basic video trainings take just a few minutes to complete, and you can sign up to care for adult pets, moms and kittens, bottle babies, pets recovering from medical procedures, and more. Blizzard's journey at the Richmond SPCA started last summer, when our staff found her timid and confused outside our building with a note from her prior owner stating they could no longer care for Blizzard due to financial hardship. Our staff brought Blizzard into our care and reassured her that she was in a safe place.

During our medical team's examination of Blizzard, they determined that the 13-year-old dog had arthritis in both of her hind knees, and they diagnosed her with Cushing's Disease. Blizzard also had dry skin which we could control with medication.

While waiting for a lasting home, Blizzard quickly befriended staff and volunteers. Her sweet and silly personality captured our hearts. Domonique Lawless, a volunteer who works specifically with dogs, made an extra effort to bond with Blizzard. "She was skittish at first, but every time I went to visit

After Marie described her ideal companion, our adoption counselors suggested she visit with Blizzard. Though Blizzard isn't a beagle, our adoption experts felt that her sweet personality could make her a good fit for the Harper family. According to Marie, it was the perfect recommendation. "Once we met her, we got hooked. We literally fell in love with her," Marie said.

### **Summer of saving**

The summer of 2023 has been an especially busy one for the Richmond SPCA and other humane organizations throughout the region. Several government agencies are reporting higher intakes of homeless animals this year compared to last, and in June, canine influenza began impacting local shelters, including our own, which contributed to kennel capacity challenges across the area. **With your generous help and support, the Richmond SPCA is tackling these issues, saving lives and delivering aid to animal guardians in need.** 

#### **Sterilization saves lives**

In our satellite Smoky's Spay & Neuter Clinic, **our team is increasing surgery capacity by about 20 percent**. This includes more low-cost surgeries for pets in government shelters and rescue groups prior to adoption and more free surgeries for free-roaming, unowned community cats brought to our clinic by volunteers engaged in Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return (TNVR) programs. We've also partnered with our good friends at Banfield to host high-volume community cat surgery days, during which their volunteer veterinarians spay and neuter as many as 100 community cats in a single day in our facilities.



## Providing support to partner agencies

The Richmond SPCA has been no-kill for more than 20 years, and we are dedicated to providing the resources necessary to help save the lives of all healthy and treatably sick and injured homeless animals



across the region. **We partner with approximately 70 shelters and rescue groups in Virginia to transfer pets**, many of whom are ill or injured, from their care to ours, thereby helping other shelters create more space to save more lives.

#### Home is where your pet is

When a pet already has a home, it is our goal, first and foremost, to do what we can to keep that pet with his family and out of a shelter. That's why we provide: a pet behavior helpline, a pet pantry, temporary boarding (to assist pet guardians who are temporarily unhoused), low-cost medical care in our full-service Susan M. Markel Veterinary Hospital, and rehoming services (so pets can go directly from one loving home to another). **Help us spread the word about these crucial services.**

# Delivering affordable vet care to those who need it the most

We're building capacity in our Susan M. Markel Veterinary Hospital to help more pets in need of low-cost services. We've hired another full-time veterinarian and part-time veterinarian; added more wellness, sick and surgery appointments; and updated qualifications for new clients to ensure more lowincome guardians have access to these essential services for their companions. And coming soon: a sixth examination room.



#### Fee-waived event boosts adoptions across region

In partnership with our friends at Ring Dog Rescue and with generous support from Community Foundation for a greater Richmond, we organized a fee-waived dog adoption event to increase adoptions and create more space in area shelters. Close to 20 shelters participated in the event, which occurred August 11 through 13, and dozens of lasting matches were made.









#### **Changes are afoot!**

Under the guidance of our three-year strategic plan, the Richmond SPCA has identified many capital improvements — to include technology investments and renovations of our facilities — that will strengthen our ability to deliver our mission as we provide vital programs and services to pets and the people who love them. We are grateful to have the support of the Mary Morton Parson's Foundation, which has awarded us a \$335,000 challenge grant to assist with these important projects.
